In 1930, Club Members raised \$16,000 for the construction of a dormitory for the Caddies. This building was located just northeast of the 1903 Power Plant in the Historic District. The U-shaped structure was the location of lodging, meals, and a night school for the young men. Attached to the building was housing for a Caddy Masters and his family.

"The golf course is a great expense and kept up by voluntary subscriptions..."

Member donations enabled the Jekyll Island Club to employ a sizable staff to oversee its golf courses and the needs of its players.

A groundskeeper, an assistant, and eight to ten additional men were hired to maintain the golf courses. The greenskeeping staff performed tasks such as mowing the greens and raking the sand traps. In 1938, a greenskeeper earned two dollars a day for his labor.

Golf experts were available to provide lessons for Club members and their guests. Caddies were also available seasonally to carry golf bags.
